
Something that I am looking forward to this year is all of the football games and other sports that I get to cheer at.

Walking the halls of Gross Catholic High School brings a sense of excitement and pride to principal Steve Eubanks. Nearly 40 years ago, he walked the halls as a student - proud to be a Cougar. He was unaware at the time that his experiences at Gross would profoundly shape his future.

"I was fortunate to be led by remarkable teachers and coaches who pushed me to maximize my potential as a student, as an athlete, and as a faithfilled young man," Mr. Eubanks recalled. "I firmly believe that I became an educator because I had such great role models and teachers at Gross."

Fast forward to August 16, 2023. Mr. Eubanks is back at Gross - this time as principal, and he says it was like coming home. His goals for the year include listening, observing, supporting and learning as much as possible about what makes Gross Catholic so special, in order to identify growth areas. He also hopes to build authentic, trusting relationships with all stakeholders.

That work began when he arrived. He is already known for sharing his excitement and energy. You only have to go as far as his Twitter page to feel the love. It is the moments surrounded by students that bring out the unabashed joy of his job. This principal understands firsthand how high school shapes a person's future.

It was at Gross that he met his wife of 33 years. They graduated together in 1984, got married, had two children and have a young grandson.



Play It Again, Mr. Dempsey

Not all rock stars play music - some teach, some coach football and some come out of retirement to help students plan their futures. Gross Catholic has just such a Rock Star in its midst - Mike Dempsey.

Like many of our teachers, administrators and board members, Mike is a graduate of Gross Catholic. He went to college, got his teaching and mathematics degrees, and returned to Gross as "Mr. Dempsey" while pursuing a Master's degree in guidance counseling.

Dempsey says. "I was already a part of the Cougar family, this time I was just on the payroll."

The year was 1980. Dempsey started out teaching Freshman and Sophomore math and coaching basketball. He had developed a love for coaching in high school. It came naturally. His dad was an athletic director for St. Mary's Parish in South Omaha. Mike would often help his dad coach budding grade schooler athletes at St. Mary's Catholic School. That love for coaching served him, and Gross Catholic well.

"Some of my favorite years while coaching were often those times when we didn't place or earn a title. The reward was being able to know that you had made a difference in the lives of students through

teaching or coaching," Dempsey explained.



After 42 years at Gross, Dempsey decided to step down, but a funny thing happened on the way to retirement. That Master's degree in counseling that Mike earned was nagging him to add another verse to his career. Gross needed a counselor. Mike had the knowhow.

So this year, Mike Dempsey returned to Gross Catholic part-time to give some 1:1 counseling to students - helping them discover what the next chapter of their lives would look like. It's music to our ears.




EnrollmentIs Up!

Alumni Spotlight: Class of 2003

Dani Mancuso-Helu

The love for women's volleyball runs deep at Gross Catholic, as it does across Nebraska. We have coached our share of champions. Among them Dani Mancuso-Helu. She joined the Gross Catholic team her freshman year. Older sister, Sarah, a senior, was one of her teammates. They went to state that year and won! Two years later, Dani's younger sister, Amanda, made the team, giving them the opportunity to compete together.

"Although I can recall many silly conversations and interactions with my teammates throughout those four years, getting the opportunity to compete with two of my sisters is what stands out the most," Dani said. Her advice for Gross students is to be grateful. "God has placed you in this moment of time and in this specific high school for a reason. Be grateful for that," she said. "He has given you a smaller community within Gross Catholic where you are known and you can know others. It is a gift. I understand you are young and some situations may seem like it's 'the end of the world' for you, but that's not true. You are loved and cared for. And if for nothing else, be thankful for that."

Dani's story led her to play for the Nebraska Cornhuskers volleyball team. She then went on to play professionally for five seasons overseas in places like Indonesia, Germany and Croatia. She married former Husker football standout Roy Helu, Jr., who also went pro - playing in the NFL for the Washington Redskins and Oakland Raiders. Now, the couple has six children with number seven on the way.

But it is volleyball that can still take her breath away. She was there on August 30, 2023, when Nebraskans filled Memorial Stadium to watch the women play. "I think what stands out most was the gratitude that filled my heart that night. To see so many former players, coaches and the 'team behind the team' as I like to call them. The people who laid the foundation ahead of

me, and the players who have followed," Dani said. "I know it's been said hundreds of times before, but don't take it for granted. there really is no place like Nebraska.



And that night, to have over 92,000 people intentionally show up, proves it!"

But, it was sharing the moment with her daughter that made the experience so incredibly special. "She is our only girl. So to have her there with me, wearing my old jersey was simply incredible. I loved watching her big brown eyes light up as she experienced each moment of that night," Dani recalled.

All of the special experiences, hard work and opportunities tie back to what she learned at Gross Catholic about teamwork, perseverance and faith.

Dani and her family live in the Bennington, Nebraska area. Her husband, Roy, is one of the lead pastors at Citylight Church. She says she is blessed to spend a lot of time with her family, including dinner at her parents' house every Sunday with all 32 of them at the table.

"I'm grateful the Lord has led me to this season of life," she said.

"I'm extremely grateful for the story God has written for my life and all those moments of success were memorable and so fun getting to experience, but the foundational joy and peace I have, has come from my relationship with Jesus."


